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

48% of all paid workers are women

But men and women typically end up at different occupations




Is segregation declining?


Occupational segregation is declining, but very

slowly

% of men/women who would have to change occupations

How long will it take to integrate?

320 YEARS

→ Assuming post-2000 rate


150 YEARS

→ Assuming post-1970 rate

Integration is asymmetric

- Male occupations integrate
- Female occupations don't

Does occupational segregation affect the gender gap in wages?



Occupational segregation explains about 18% of the gender gap in wages, net of human capital- differences

Occupational segregation is:

- ... extensive
- ... persistent
- ... consequential
